PROGRAMS

Re-Entry Alliances

Connecting inmates with community re-entry organizations and community agencies to facilitate inmate connections to employment, housing, food, clothing, mental health, a local church, and other needs.

Bible Mentoring

Partnering with Crossroads Prison Ministries to provide mentoring opportunities.

Healing the Wounded Heart

Healing the Wounded Heart helps people with pain and/or trauma find healing, engage with Scripture, and become more resilient, leading to better relationships with family, friends, and the community.

Authentic Remote Ministry

Volunteers connect to inmates from outside of the jails by writing letters of hope and encouragement.

GRO Pods

GRO Pods are dedicated housing units in jails where inmates voluntarily engage in programs that teach biblically-based life principles.

Addiction Recovery Classes

Providing biblically-based substance abuse treatment classes. Partnering with local churches and community services to provide seamless transitions to addiction recovery upon release from jail.

Reach the Forgotten Jail Ministry (RTF) has been serving Michigan county jails for over 55 years. We currently serve in 33 county jails with the mission to provide Christcentered hope and healing through biblically-based, chaplain-led, volunteer jail ministries. Our vision is for every incarcerated person to experience new life in Christ and to develop healthy family, church, and community relationships. Our chaplains and volunteers walk alongside inmates by providing services and programs that strengthen them through spiritual formation. To help reduce the return to jail rate, we work to establish alliances with churches and organizations that will support individuals when they exit jail. As lives transform behind bars, the effect is that families and communities are impacted. This evidence lies in Amanda's story, "After a lifetime of abusive relationships, depression, and addiction. I didn't want to exist. In jail I joined the GRO Pod and I accepted Jesus into my heart. I have a purpose now. I'm the mom I was supposed to be, and I thank God every day."


Like many young boys, Eddie found joy in being outdoors and playing sports. As a talented basketball player, he was being scouted by many colleges. However, Eddie recalls growing up in the foster care system, institutionalized in various group homes. He loved being with family, but mourns the lack of consistency, guidance, and nurturing he needed in his younger years. Hanging with the wrong crowd, he was shot in the leg. This ruined the dream of being able to play basketball in the same capacity he once enjoyed. He was eventually arrested for armed robbery. Sentenced to 20 years in prison, he again faced life institutionalized. Eddie was released in 2018 and was on the right track for many years. He had housing, employment, and support.

During the pandemic, Eddie lost his job which led to him not being able to pay rent and consequentially, he lost his house. Depressed, he re-engaged drugs and alcohol. After some bad decisions, Eddie found himself in the Tuscola County Jail.
