GENESEE COUNTY

Some of our greatest impact comes through providing a presence in the jail. Through our programs and one-to-one mentoring, we are able to meet people in their darkest hours. As a result, the culture of the jail is impacted. Even when we are not present, inmates find ways to pray together and encourage one another.

HEALING THE WOUNDED HEART

OCEANA COUNTY

HWH is a program that trains volunteers and community members to lead healing groups, both inside and outside of the jail. Through healing groups, people learn to address trauma, lament, and put their hope in God's healing power.





GRO POD ALLEGAN COUNTY

GRO (God Restoring Offenders) Pods are offered in some county jails for inmates to voluntarily participate in various weeks of classes and Bible studies. Housed together, these individuals create a tight-knit bond as they walk alongside one another in learning biblical principles and life skills. This work naturally carries over as they exit jail.



REENTRY ALLIANCES INGHAM COUNTY

RAMS

Some of our most important work is being able to partner with the community to provide a continuum of care for individuals as they are released from jail. Our hope is to deepen and increase the number of partnerships that we have with reentry alliances. Pictured here is Chaplain Robert from Ingham County with Joey after he moved into a transitional home when he was released.

ADDICTION RECOVERY HURON COUNTY

In partnership with RTF, recovery programs are provided in our county jails. Some of the programs include: Life Recovery Bible classes, AA, NA, and Celebrate Recovery. These partnerships allow for inmates to start their recovery journey inside the jail and then find community programs to continue when released.

ONE-TO-ONE MENTORING MUSKEGON COUNTY

Chaplains and volunteers provide inmates with one-toone mentoring whenever they request it. The options are limitless on what an inmate can work through during this time. They can talk through personal struggles, familial issues, or spend time praying and digging into the Word together.





PERSONS OF PEACE

CLARE COUNTY

Chaplain Bill Dyke serves the Clare County Jail (CCJ), which can house up to 176 men and women on any given day. In partnership with a local church, Bill hosts Celebrate Recovery in CCJ. This program is provided weekly for inmates to engage in worship and recovery work. This partnership builds a bridge for inmates as they return to their community.

Amanda, Brett, and Ron are 3 individuals who have returned to their community. Each described their childhood as dysfunctional, and as a result they spent years with the wrong crowds and trapped in a cycle of addiction. Each with a different journey that led them to CCJ, it was there that they met Bill, were connected to Celebrate Recovery, and found a life of recovery and transformation.

Amanda and Brett have now both been sober for 2 years. Amanda works in the Clare County Recovery Court and Brett is in college seeking a degree in automotive diesel services, with a 3.4 GPA! Ron has been sober for 4 years, has regained custody of 7 of his 8 children and helps lead Celebrate Recovery in the community, and hopefully in the jail in the future.

SHERIFF BAPTISM MECOSTA COUNTY

Chaplain Randy leads the chaplaincy in the Mecosta County Jail (MCJ), which can house up to 100 men and women on any given day. Sheriff Brian Miller is a strong supporter of RTF, and he believes strongly in the work that is happening in the jail that he leads.

In September, Sheriff Miller participated in a retreat called "Heroes Return," which is for first responders to come together and encourage one another in their work.

Shane, a former inmate of MCJ, also participated in the retreat. Sober for one year, Shane was approached by Sheriff Miller. Many baptisms were taking place and Sheriff Miller desired for Shane to be the one to baptize him. Shane's response was, "How can I baptize you? I've only been clean for one year!"

Sheriff Miller was resolute in his decision. As a former inmate, Shane had the opportunity to baptize the sheriff of Mecosta county. He says this, "The way God shows up in my life doesn't even surprise me anymore." Outside of God's Kingdom, these stories are unimaginable.
